

Discover Tupper Lake's Historic Travel Routes



Tupper Lake is situated in the heart of a rich network of historic waterways which provide opportunities for paddlers of all abilities to spend an afternoon or a lifetime exploring crystalline lakes, hidden ponds, frothy brooks and winding streams. The Adirondack Trail and Olympic Scenic Byways lead travelers to a wonderful world of interconnected waterways. The region is home to the headwaters of the ten major Adirondack rivers, collectively known as the *Ten Rivers Region*—Cold River, Raquette River, Beaver River, Marion River, Hudson River, Oswegatchie River, St. Regis River, Bog River, Grasse River and the Saranac River. A New York section of the multi-state *Northern Forest Canoe Trail*, a recreational waterway connecting the Adirondacks to northern Maine, is not to be missed.

Top Paddle Picks

1 Raquette River to Piercefield stretch (17 miles); 2 Raquette River from the Crusher to Simon Pond (9 miles); 3 Tupper Lake; 4 Lows Lake via the Bog River Flow (11 miles); 5 William C. Whitney Area; 6 Lake Lila (17 campsites); 7 Raquette River between Long Lake and Tupper Lake (30 miles)
